

Message from the Pastor

Sin and Mercy

Possibly the oldest Christian prayer is simply, "Lord, have mercy." It is based on the appeal of a blind man in Jericho named Bartimaeus in Mark 10:47. It has been an integral and essential part of Christian liturgy ever since.

Unfortunately, this prayer, appears to be a problem for some folks. I am told the words are too negative. The criticism is that begging for mercy and calling oneself a sinner only reinforce the kind of oppressive, self-flagellating religious expressions that Christianity is infamous for. It is especially disempowering for those victimized by religious imperialism, like women. Not only do practices like this keep people under the thumb of the authorities, but such self-hatred tends to get expressed in acts of misanthropic violence. Finally, there seems to be an assumption that God is always ready to punish and afflict, but can be dissuaded by our pathetic pleas for mercy. Surely we can do better than morose and depressing, chest-beating, guilt obsessed begging for God to forgive us. So the argument goes.

First of all, modern people don't like to talk about "sin" at all. We see it as a guilt-trip. Surely it is better to awaken to our original blessing, than to wallow in misery about our sins.

The fact that sin has become a rejected category for sophisticated, modern people indicates not so much a healthy self-esteem as a deliberate reticence to face the wall-to-wall mess we have made of the planet and its people, including ourselves, over the last 500 years. We have reduced the word "sin" to refer to somebody else's sexuality, when actually it denotes a comprehensive breakdown of relationships.

Talk about “sin” simply recognizes that we humans, in our egocentric condition, are functioning as *if* separated from God, creation, others, and even our true selves. Calling ourselves sinners does *not* mean we are essentially bad people who do not deserve to live. It means, as in the first of the 12 steps of recovery, realizing that our life is unmanageable, and that we are indeed complicit in all kinds of evil.

This is what it means to be “woke.” When we do awaken to our original blessing and goodness, one of the first things that happens is we understand how far our words, thoughts, and actions had drifted away from that. Awakening means realizing that we had been, in effect, asleep, and taking responsibility for what we did when we were not as fully conscious.

Awakening causes us at the same time to see the wreckage we have left behind us in the world, in our relationships, in our own bodies and souls, with clarity and honesty. It is not that we are bad, but we have done bad things, usually inadvertently, unknowingly, or rationalizing that they are actually good.

Secondly, the prayer is about mercy. Mercy is the recognition of our original blessing and goodness. Awareness of mercy — that is, of forgiveness, compassion, peace, acceptance, wholeness, and welcome — *is* awakening.

Mercy is not just something we receive and then keep for ourselves, like a commodity. Mercy, like so many of the qualities Jesus talks about and embodies, is something in which we participate by *sharing* it. To receive mercy is to *give* it. If we do not become merciful, we will not receive mercy. Mercy is a *flow*. It goes through us. We only have it only to the extent that we give it away.

Therefore, “have mercy on me, a sinner” emphatically does *not* mean, “don’t punish me for being such a terrible person.” It means rather, “Let the flow of your mercy, goodness, and blessing overwhelm and transform me and my world through me.” It means “Let me *be* your mercy, your compassion, and your forgiveness in the world.”

And yes, it includes the implication that we have a way to go in realizing this, but at least we are hopefully making progress. The sign of this progress is that we have the sense to pray for mercy.

Starting Again

Rally Day for Sunday School was eventful at Hope. Not only did both classes meet together and have a combined lesson on God's creation, but we also participated in our Backpack Blessing, which occurred at the end of the service. The children brought their backpacks in and placed them on the chancel and Rev. Rack said a prayer for all, blessing their new school year, anointing each child with blessed water from the baptismal font. Each child also received a written blessing to carry with them for their new school year. Not to be forgotten, the adults who touch the children's lives (parents, teachers, bus drivers) were also part of the blessing.



At Hope, we prepare for the return to school all year long. One of our mission projects, Back to School, benefits the families with school-aged children who attend the Eatontown Food Pantry as well as our own Giving Tree families with children. All year long, \$25 Target cards are purchased with some of the proceeds from our monthly SCRIP orders. A list of qualifying and attending families at the pantry is prepared, monitored and kept current by our congregant, Nancy Massa, who also volunteers at the pantry. 10 families from the pantry and 4 Giving Tree families received 35 Target cards this year – that's a value of \$875. 8 cards were purchased with our share of the Pentecost Offering, so 27 Target cards were purchased with our SCRIP proceeds. What a big help to families who might not have the funds for school supplies to start another school year. So during the year, when you hear that it's SCRIP Sunday, please consider buying a gift card(s) for your own needs. The more you buy, the more that can be recycled into the benefiting projects.

Ladies' Book/Bible Study



On November 17th we will begin a new book study on Eric Metaxas' book, *7 Women and the Secret of Their Greatness* – seven women who changed the course of history – Joan of Arc, Susanna Wesley, Hannah More, Maria Skobtsova, Corrie ten Boom, Rosa Parks and Mother Teresa.

“Each of these world-changing figures followed the call placed on her life, doing so with remarkable feminine dignity. Teenaged Joan of Arc heard God's command and led the French army to a mighty victory over the British. Hannah More played a crucial role in the abolition of slavery in the British Empire. Corrie ten Boom risked her life to hide Dutch Jews from the Nazis in World War II and somehow survived the horrors of a concentration camp, but her greatest feat was forgiving her tormentors years later. And Rosa Parks's God-given sense of justice and unshakable dignity; helped launch the twentieth century's greatest social movement.” (from the back cover of the book)

Hope Presbyterian Church has been here in Tinton Falls for twenty-five years. Our ministry has developed and changed in many ways over that time. Recently, while preparing for Eatontown Day, I was reflecting on the journey of this congregation from its historical roots in the Shrewsbury Presbyterian Church, its Broad Street home in Eatontown built with parts from a NYC church shipped here on barges, to the years when the congregation was “on the move.” I was not a part of the congregation at that time, but you couldn’t live in the area and not notice those ubiquitous “On the Move” bumper stickers. When the present building was ready, the congregation actually walked together with signs and banners from Eatontown to this brand new church in such a beautiful location. The culmination of years of planning, waiting in HOPE. I think we can all imagine the joy and thankfulness of that day. We came to Hope several months after that, and the enthusiasm and pride in what had been accomplished was still palpable as it was for many years. The opportunities for ministry as God calls us to do infused the congregation.

Commitment Cards that have been provided to the congregation help us to be thoughtful stewards in using our resources. Please consider prayerfully how an increase in financial support for the year ahead would positively impact this ministry. If we all do a little, it adds up to a lot. Thanks to the faithful people of Hope decades ago, we have been provided with a house of worship that is special to all of us. Let us be good stewards of this gift, honoring those who came before us and who lovingly donated what we have today.

Hope also needs our time and talents to help us carry our ministry forward. We are not a church with office and cleaning help, nor grounds maintenance beyond mowing and snow removal. All of us have physical and mental talents, various areas of knowledge that would contribute to Hope’s maintenance, and growth. Let’s greet the next quarter century with an active outlook, preserving and expanding what is happening at Hope as we reach out in the name of the Lord.

Here at Hope Church, we have a Prayer Ministry that is multi-faceted:

A Prayer Chain that maintains confidentiality while enlisting the prayer support of many, many prayer warriors who have volunteered to participate in this ministry. In addition to using the "bluies" to submit a prayer request, you may email Bill Heller at wheller@gmail.com.

Pastor Paul offers prayer during Communion. He is always standing off to the side as the servers distribute the elements, waiting for whomever needs to pray with him.

Every Sunday during worship we have an informal time of sharing during which we can verbalize prayer requests, and those requests are then included in our corporate prayer time. Every other Sunday after worship, at 10:30, we meet at the foot of the cross to share prayer requests and pray together, with and for each other, lifting our requests to Jesus. There is no formal script for this; we simply follow the leading of the Holy Spirit, usually meeting for 30-45 minutes. All are welcome! Bring your coffee upstairs and join us!

We consider it a precious privilege to pray for each other, giving all praise and glory to Jesus. If you have need of prayer for any reason, please do not hesitate to get in touch with us.



The Story of Little Blueie and the Prayer Chain

Perhaps you don't really know me. I mean, I know you see me every week when you come to church. I live in that little rack in the pew. You know, with the Hymnals and Bibles. And Pastor Paul introduces me every week. He reminds everyone to "fill out the bluesies". But do you know me...really know me...more than just my name? Do you know that I have an important job to do?

The first important thing is that people can put their name on me. That's one of the ways that Mr. Heller knows when someone is missing. Then he lets the Deacons (and some other people) know, and they can see if there is any way we can help. But I think my most important job is to carry prayer requests to Mr. Heller. Let me tell you how that works.

On Sunday mornings, during the worship service, I just sit there waiting until someone picks me out of the rack. Then that person can write on me whatever they want people to pray about. The prayer request can be detailed, or not; it can include someone's name, or not. God knows the details whether you write them or not.

After I am written on, the person puts me into the offering plate. I just lie there very quietly, guarding my special message. After the worship service, an usher takes me and puts me with a bunch of other bluesies, and gives us all to Mr. Heller. He takes us all home with him.

When Mr. Heller gets home, he looks at all of us very carefully, and he types a list on his computer of all the prayer messages we have carried from that day. Then the list gets sent to about three dozen people who have signed up to pray for whatever requests come in. Those people get that list in their email, and then they can pray. It's really very easy. So actually, my job is done when Mr. Heller is finished transferring my special message to his list. But I want to tell you a couple of other important things.

I wasn't sure you knew how important I am, and what a big job I have, and what happens to those things people write each week. So I wanted to tell you about that. But also, Mr. Heller told me to tell you that if anyone feels like they want to be a part of the Prayer Chain and have that special list emailed to them, all they need to do is tell Mr. Heller. He even gave me his email address to make it easy: wheller@gmail.com. In case someone doesn't have email, but wants to pray, he gave me his phone number too: 732-693-7346. He sends lists out "snail mail" too! Also, we bluesies all want to get involved in this praying thing. Mr. Heller says it would be good if more people wrote things for people to be praying about. So I want to encourage you to write requests.....I know from overhearing some conversations that a lot of you have things that could use some prayer!

Thanks for listening to my story....I'll see you next week when you come to worship!




